- Doha Round
- Major Disappointment
- Underwhelming progress
- Now Four Years Late
- Talk the talk or walk the walk
- Train is Stalled in the Station

- E.U. Lamy
- Millennium Big Bang
- Big Fizzle Seattle
- Doha/ 9-11
- Political statement
- Developing country suspicions
- Hell no we won't go





What can we agree on

- Least developed countries (97%)
- Export subsidies
 - Who classifies them?
 - Cotton eventually





What we can't agree on

Market Access

- UR payment
- Interlinkage to Domestic Support
- Who will benefit?

Domestic Support Reductions

- How far?
- How fast?
- What it is/is not trade or production distorting





Canada shortchanged in UR

- Market access beef
 - Japan E.U.
- Market access pork
 - Japan E.U.
- Domestic support grains and oilseeds
- TRQ manipulation



Hong Kong – Davos and April Target

- Promises, promises
- Political Reality
 - Unrest in E.U.
 - Ambition outstrips appetitive for adjustment
 - Mid-term U.S. election
 - Mistrust form developing world
 - G-10 concerns
 - Farm income crisis
- WTO is not self-policing



Where is Canada's leverage?

- Ahead of the crowd on export subsidies/ domestic support reductions
- Already adjusted to NAFTA
- All bound, mostly low tariffs
- Little left to give
- Will not defend our rights, e.g., Brazil lose leverage
- Unfocussed approach
- Link objectives to access



Eliminate Unfriendly Farm Policies

- Senseless Divisions among farm groups
- Farmers should not fight farmers
- Divide and conquer
- Farm groups do not negotiate
- Blame government, not farmers
- Market access concessions must be offset by gains
- Farmers must work together
- Set common priorities
- Solidarity



The New Government's Challenge

- Must regain lost influence in Geneva
- G-4, G-6 Canada is G-1
- Why not bureaucrats not at fault
- Canada needs to offer something different
- Ministers must take responsibility
- Rural dependency of government
- Farmers must define what they want





Do not pay twice - again

- We paid in UR but were not paid
- Who wants access to Canada
- What do they want
- What will we get in return?
- Who should we target ?
- What does Canada want ?
- What do targets want ?
- Are we too theological?
- Forget cookie cutter approach focus and target.





Identify potential markets

- Japan, Korea, India
- What can we do for them?
- Are bilaterals the answer?
- Can we change ruling on AoA Article 9.1(c)?
- Better benchmark- world price
- COP arguments by USA depend on forum
- USA /EU at risk and should be interested

WTO not self-policing

- Obligations mean nothing unless enforced
- Farm income crisis many causes
- Must challenge non compliance or cheating
- 2003 Gave Ottawa challenge roadmap for U.S. N.Z. subsidies
- Brazil sugar/cotton/soybeans
- Uruguay rice
- Canada feed grains? pulses?
- Must challenge -WHY NOT?
- Nice guys finish last





Bilaterals/Regionals

- Pragmatism vs Crusaders
- Mexico has major benefits on pork in FTA with Japan
- Canada is at disadvantage
- Mexico sets aside problems-does the deal
- Canada wants perfection very elusive
- There is no Holy Grail.





Targets

- Mercosur (population 190 million)
- ASEAN (population 592 million)
- Korea (population 48.5 million)
- Japan (population 125 million)
- India (population 1 billion)
- China (population 1.3 billion)



Flexibility and pragmatism Needed

- Canada must get into more markets first with preferences
- We have already adjusted to competition with USA
- Always playing catch up
- Be more like Mexico fix difficult issues later
- WTO test "substantially all the trade" is 85%
- FTA's offer focused benefits and timetables
- WTO long wait
- USA FTA's face political obstruction
- Canada can be there first

Governments

- Recognize importance of agriculture
- Challenge to secure rights
- Adopt more pragmatic approach to bilateral regional FTAs
