Positioning the agri-food sector for success

OTTAWA, July 18, 2011 – Improving human health and enhancing environmental sustainability are catalysts for creating new and profitable opportunities, and can open new markets for farmers and position the agri-food sector for future success, according to the Canadian Agri-Food Policy Institute (CAPI).

CAPI believes that creating a more collaborative operating environment among agri-food players, in conjunction with a diverse array of other partners, will allow the agri-food sector to create market opportunities and have a beneficial impact on society. To support such "food systems," governments need to better integrate policies throughout their departments and agencies. As well, government and agri-food players need to adopt performance targets and metrics to support progressive change. These ideas are among the many concepts espoused in CAPI's Destination Report, which was published in February 2011. The Report provided ideas on how Canada could strive for a more profitable and competitive agri-food sector, a healthier population, and more sustainable ecosystems.
